### Dear Friends,

Cancer care extends far beyond the walls of a hospital.

While treatment addresses the disease, people living with cancer, and those who care for them, also face emotional, practical, physical, financial, and social challenges that don't end when an appointment is over. That's where Wellspring Alberta plays a unique role. As a trusted partner in Alberta's broader spectrum of cancer care, we provide evidence-informed programs and access to a welcoming community that help people navigate the many realities of living with cancer.

Thanks to your generosity, that support remains available free of charge to anyone who needs it.

In 2025, Wellspring Alberta provided more than 49,000 program visits through over 7,500 hours of programming, reaching people in 127 communities across Alberta. (194 since 2020). As our presence continues to grow in rural and regional communities, more Albertans than ever before can access evidence-informed cancer support closer to home, online, or in one of our welcoming locations.

But numbers only tell part of the story.

Throughout this report, you'll meet people like Krista — someone whose family's experience with cancer inspired her to become a Wellspring member, volunteer, Community Connector, fundraiser, and program leader. Her story reminds us that the impact of generosity doesn't end when a program finishes. It creates connections, inspires others to give back, and strengthens communities across Alberta.

You'll also hear directly from members who describe Wellspring as a place where they felt understood, where they rediscovered hope, and where they found the confidence to keep moving forward. Those experiences are possible because you believe that emotional, social, and practical support are essential parts of living well with cancer.

To our donors, volunteers, partners, healthcare colleagues, and everyone who champions Wellspring Alberta — thank you. Your compassion makes it possible for people facing cancer, along with their families and caregivers, to access our programs free of charge, exactly when they need them most.

The momentum we've built together over the past several years is creating new opportunities to reach even more Albertans. As we look ahead, we'll continue expanding access to our programs across the province — in person, online and in communities across Alberta — strengthening partnerships with healthcare and community organizations, investing in the volunteers who make our work possible, and growing awareness of Wellspring so more people know support is available when they need it most.

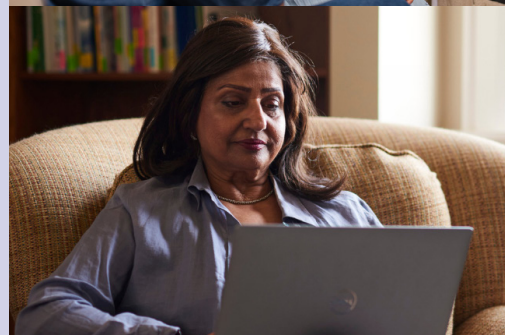

## ***Krista Weiss Climbs for Wellspring***



Some challenges are meant to push our limits. Others, like a 1,370-step stairclimb challenge, are designed to push us well beyond our limits, and to do so with others in mind. That's the feat Krista Weiss signed up for when she decided to Challenge the Chief on June 14, 2026, at the 12th annual Firefighter Stairclimb Challenge in support of Wellspring Alberta.

**"The stairclimb challenge is definitely out of my comfort zone," said Krista. "And even with training, I can't say for sure I'll feel ready on June 14, but I will do it and get it done."**

Indeed, she did — just like her husband and others she knows, who have faced cancer with no option but to go through it.

"Anyone who has experienced a life-threatening medical event or has had a life-changing diagnosis knows there are so many things that are out of your control, and so many times you have to do things you never imagined you could do, and tolerate situations you didn't think you would have the strength to tolerate. But somehow, you just do it," she said. "What's the stairclimb compared to that? I've seen my husband go through so much and handle it all with grace and kindness. His strength gives me strength."

It's empathy and compassion that fueled her through the climb and the months of training leading up to it.

### Stepping Into Wellspring

Krista first learned about Wellspring in 2022, when she was a member of the (former) Palliser Triangle Health Advisory Council.

Despite almost three years of walking alongside her husband through a cancer diagnosis and treatment, she had not heard of the organization until Wellspring's outreach manager delivered a presentation to the council, highlighting Wellspring's aim to extend its reach across the province.

Krista immediately recognized the value of what the organization was offering and joined Wellspring as an online member. Having experienced the medical system firsthand, she understood the need for non-medical

resources — support for the emotional, practical, and human sides of cancer that runs alongside the medical treatment plan.

When she felt ready, she decided to give back. In 2023, Krista attended a Wellspring information session in Medicine Hat. There, she met Sarah, a local Wellspring volunteer, and learned about the Community Connector role — volunteers in rural communities who sign up to help people in their communities learn about Wellspring and access its programs.

She applied, completed the training, and became a Wellspring Community Connector. In that role, Krista has helped raise awareness of Wellspring across Medicine Hat and surrounding communities — connecting people to cancer programs and resources they might not otherwise discover.

**"I see the difference that Wellspring programs have made in people's lives," she says. "And I am very proud to be a part of the Wellspring Alberta family."**



In 2024, when Wellspring received a grant from the Medicine Hat Health Foundation, allowing the organization to begin offering in-person Cancer Connect gatherings in the city twice a month, Krista stepped in to help get it off the ground, and has worked with the other Community Connectors to create a welcoming space where people living with cancer and caregivers could connect with one another. Her involvement took a new turn in 2026, when she accepted the role as program leader for the Monday Cancer Connect session.

Even with an added leadership role, Krista remains committed to her volunteer position — helping people find their way to Wellspring. “I consider myself a Community Connector volunteer first and foremost,” she says.

What continues to inspire her is the collective purpose that drives the pulse of Wellspring.

**“In this organization there are so many amazing people working together toward a common goal — that no one has to face cancer alone,” Krista shares. “It’s such an amazing guiding principle, and I’m just so grateful to be a part of it.”**

Today, Krista brings both professional insight and lived experience to her work with Wellspring. She understands the complexity of cancer care, from the medical realities to the quieter, often unmet needs that surface in the mind and heart.

**“I see the difference that Wellspring programs have made in people’s lives,” she says. “And I am very proud to be a part of the Wellspring Alberta family.”**

On June 14, 2026, Krista climbed all 57 stories of Calgary’s tallest tower, Brookfield Place, while wearing full firefighter gear as part of the Firefighter Stairclimb Challenge. Thanks to the generosity of her supporters, she surpassed her fundraising goal, raising \$5,158 to help ensure more Albertans facing cancer can access Wellspring’s programs and services free of charge. ♥

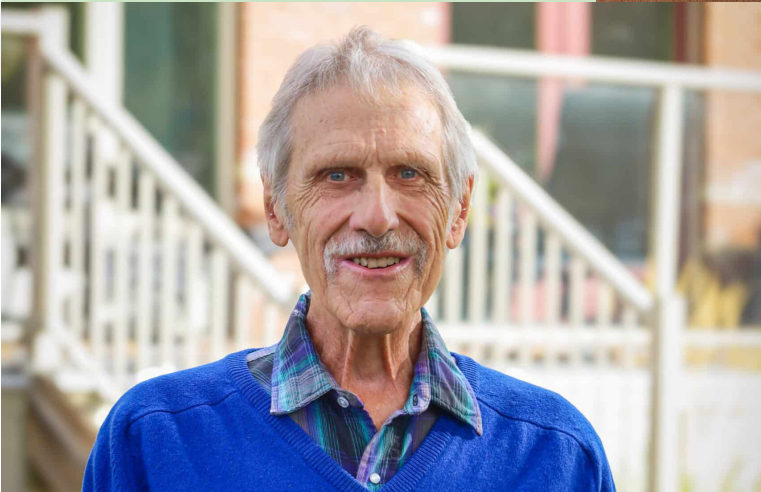

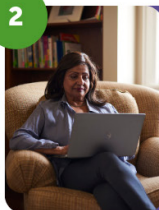

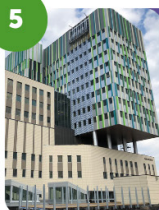

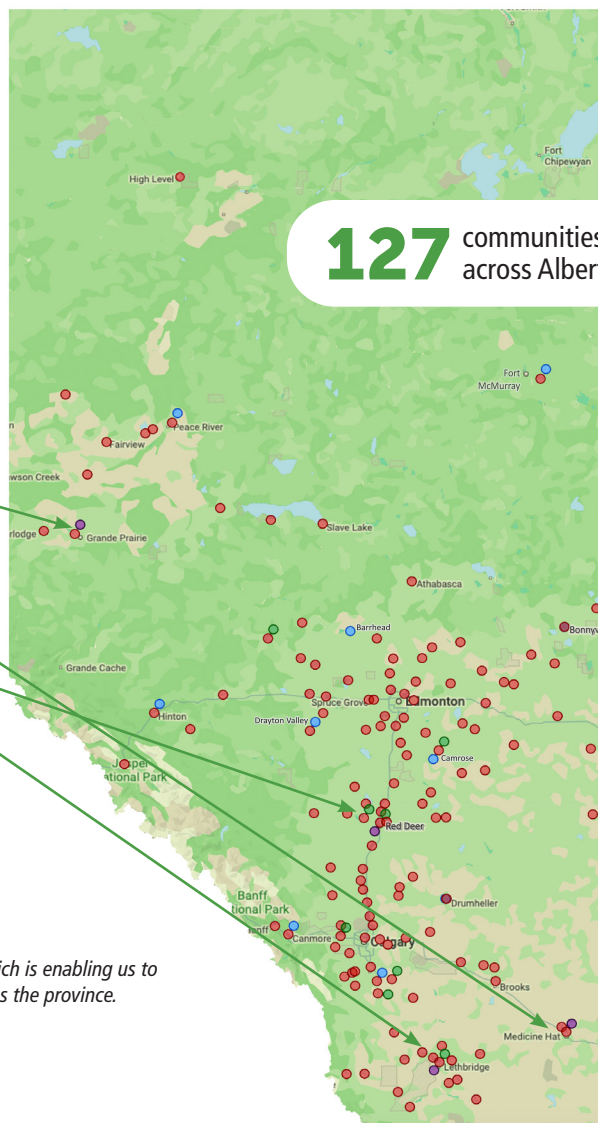

- Purple Regional Cancer Centre

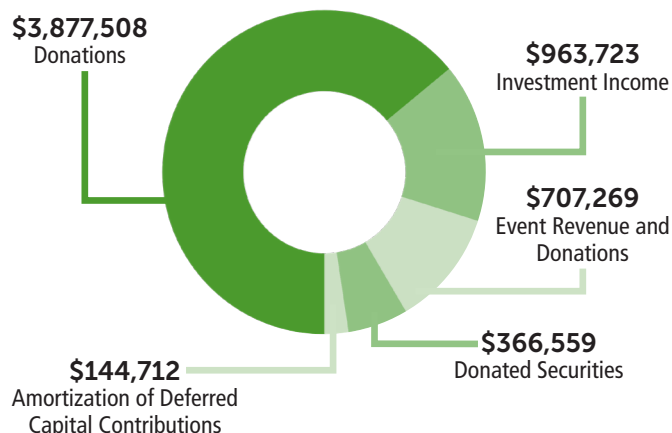

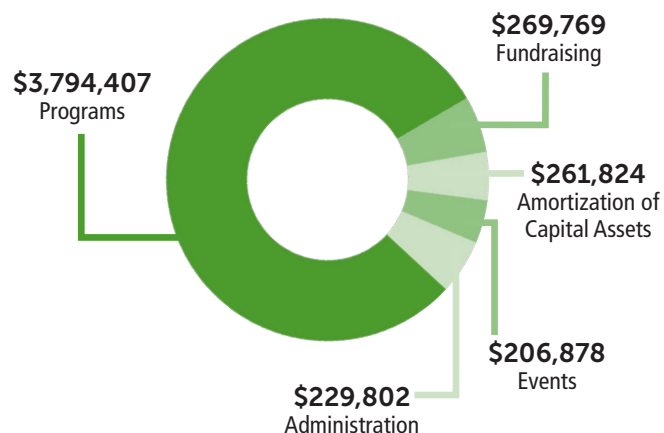
### Revenue, 2025
